June 27, 2024

1. Call to Order. A Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors of the East Orange County Water District held at the District Office, located at 185 N. McPherson Road in the City of Orange, California, was called to order by President DOUGLASS DAVERT at 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 27, 2024, with President DAVERT leading the Pledge of Allegiance. Public attendance was permitted in-person only. JEFFREY HOSKINSON, Secretary, recorded the minutes of the meeting.

3. Public Communications to the Board. Mr. Micah Fromkin addressed the Board, indicating that he was currently caught between regulations, between the regional water board requiring him to remove the septic system and trying to connect to the EOCWD sewer. Mr. Fromkin requested that an item be added to the agenda to discuss at a future meeting, indicating that he would send information on his situation to be included. Mr. Fromkin thanked General Manager Youngblood for his discussion of his situation.

14. Monthly Legislative & Outreach Report. Honorable John Lewis of Lewis Consulting briefly addressed the Board, discussing recent Orange County Board of Supervisors meetings, California ocean conditions, EPA warnings relative to Chinese and Russian hackers seeking to sabotage drinking and water systems, and recent events at the Orange County Local Area Formation Commission ("LAFCO") meetings. Mr. Lewis discussed specifically the transformation of the South Orange County Wastewater Authority ("SOCWA") at LAFCO. Mr. Lewis also provided an update on the presidential race.

ACTION TAKEN: The Board, on motion by MURDOCH, seconded by SEARS, by unanimous vote received and filed the reports.

12. Fiscal Year ("FY") 2024-25 Annual Budget. General Manager Youngblood provided a presentation on the budget, with an overview of the wholesale, retail, and sewer systems. General Manager Youngblood discussed a potential sewer to retail zone loan, which will be subject to further discussion in coming months. President DAVERT discussed the rate stabilization reserve. Vice-President MURDOCH appreciated the report, noting that the retail zone had spent a lot of money as was expected. A discussion ensued over Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MET") costs and PFAS costs. An update on the PFAS well was also provided.



ACTION TAKEN: The Board, on motion from MURDOCH, seconded by THOMS, by unanimous vote approved the proposed Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget and adopted Resolution No. 944 determining the appropriations subject to limitation.

July 2024

The following report is a summary of the District's activities over the past month.

SEWER

1) ID1 Update

Activities & Accomplishments for June include:

- Provided training to water staff on use of combo trucks (on going).

Update

Ten (10) sewer permits were issued in June; five (5) permits were issued for SFR remodels, four (4) in the unincorporated area and one (1) in the City of Tustin; three (3) permits were issued for ADUs all in the City of Tustin; one (1) permit was issued for a new SFR in the unincorporated area; and one (1) permit was issued for a commercial remodel in the City of Tustin.

WHOLESALE ZONE

1) WZ Water Demands

2) Water Quality Update

On September 6, 2023, Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD) provided a water quality notice informing member agencies that the Diemer plant service area was experiencing nitrification. To address this MWD implemented several operational changes at the Diemer plant which included raising plant effluent pH, maintaining a plant effluent total chlorine residual of 2.7 mg/L, and minimizing free ammonia leaving the plant. In addition, the source water blend for the Diemer plant was lowered from approximately 80 percent State Water Project (SWP) to 25 percent. Once MET made the changes described above, staff was able to see significant improvements in water quality throughout the WZ system.

Update: Water quality throughout the system remains good. No issues to report.

3) WZ Connection Permits

Five (5) permits were issued in June; four (4) permits were issued in the City of Tustin and one (1) in the unincorporated area.

RETAIL ZONE

1) Water Demand – see attachments

2) East Orange DroughtReach™ Program

Update: RZ Demand was 2% higher in June 2024 than June 2023. Water efficiency messaging continues through social media and print media (Foothill Sentry).

3) Well / Booster Station Operations

On June 25, 2024, EOCWD resumed delivery of groundwater to the retail water system. The District has not served any groundwater to this point since May of 2019. Going forward, one-hundred percent of retail system demands will be met using groundwater at least until the end of 2024. The current basin pumping percentage is 85%.

Well Levels – Update: Water levels have declined over the last month as shown on the attached graph. The pumping water level for the East Well in July was 215 feet BGS (below ground surface) while the VanderWerff Well pumping water level was 225 BGS. Please note that the VanderWerff Well continues to pump 24/7 at a rate of 1500 gpm. Historically pumping water levels have been as low as 297 feet BGS back in July 2014).

4) Circula Panorama Pipeline Conversion (Zone 3 to 2) and Replacement Project

Update: The installation of the Customer PRV's is complete and the pipeline construction is in progress. The contractor has completed the segment in Fairhaven Extension and will begin construction on the Circula Panorama segment. Project completion is expected in November.

5) VanderWerff Well/PFAS Treatment

Update: The well and treatment plant became operational June 25, 2024.

6) **System Leaks**

None to report.

7) **Water Availability Request/Connection Permits**

No permits were issued in June.

8) **Monthly WZ & RZ Operations Activities**

- Installed Vista Panorama hydro-pneumatic vessels on new concrete pad and connected to system.
- Started up PFAS treatment plant.

- Returned Newport reservoir to service after warranty repair work was completed.

- Started Brae Glen pipeline replacement project.
- Attended meetings for Barrett Booster Station, ID1, SCADA, Admin Building, Vista Panorama reservoir, Newport reservoir projects and Water Standards Update, Zone 2 to Zone 3 project.
- Ordered misc. tools, parts, and materials for water and sewer departments.
- Completed Dig Alerts.
- Monitored daily operations of treatment plant, reservoir chlorination system at Andres reservoir (Ops. Manager).
- Attended Groundwater Producer Meetings (Eng. Manager).
- Submitted monthly, quarterly, and annual reports to SWRCB.
- Reviewed weekly water quality data.
- Ordered water quality supplies.
- Attend weekly maintenance and operations meeting with GM (Engineering and Ops. Managers).

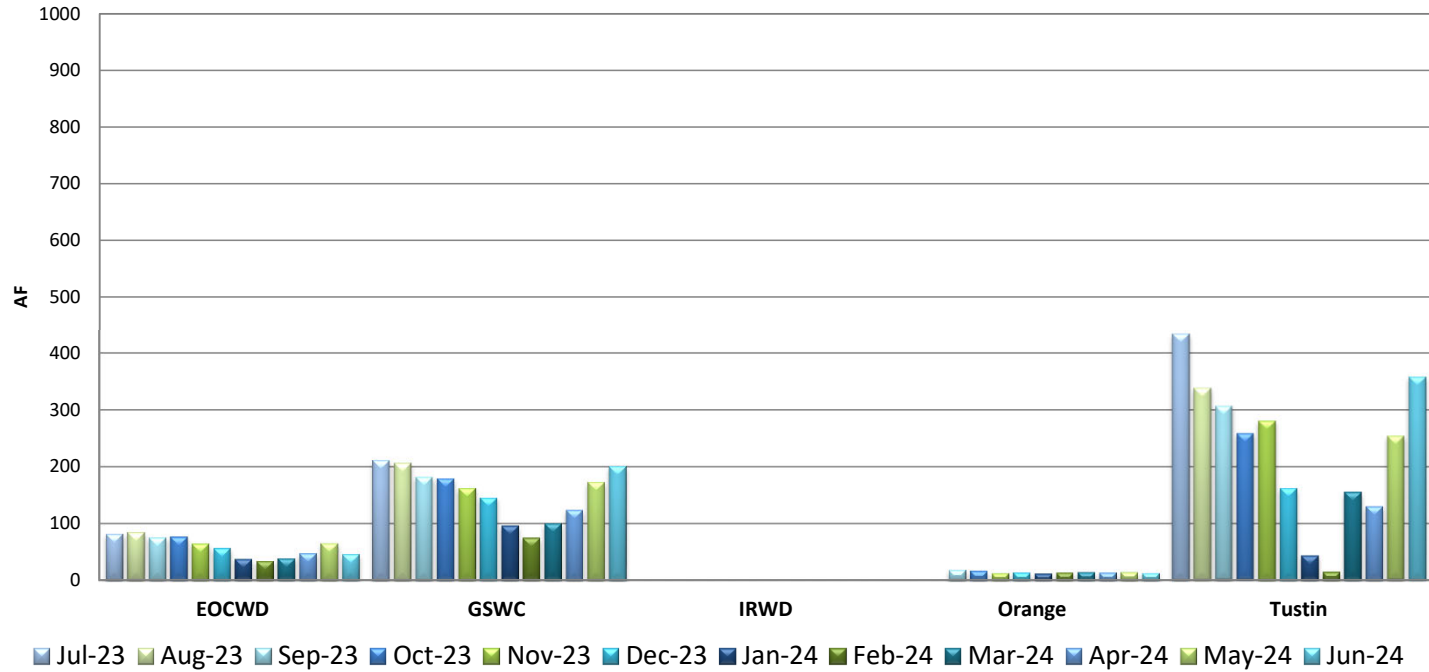

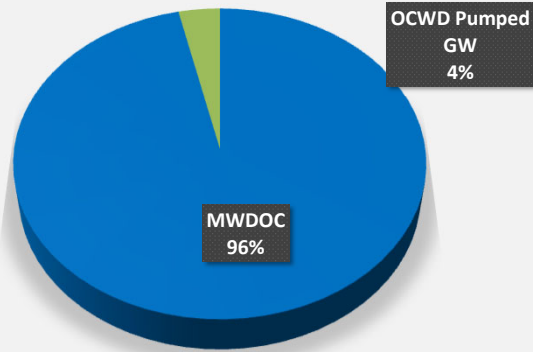

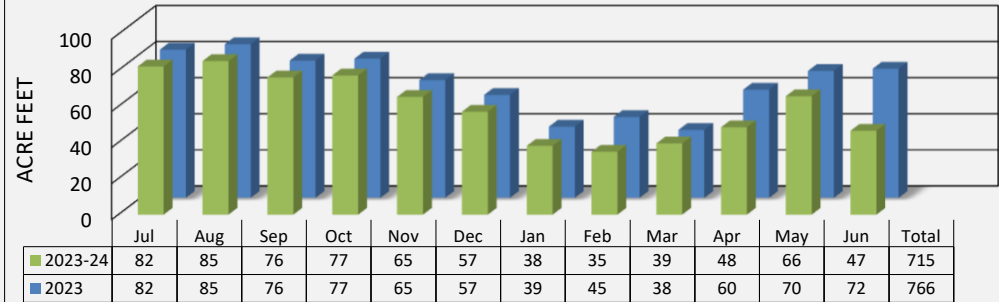

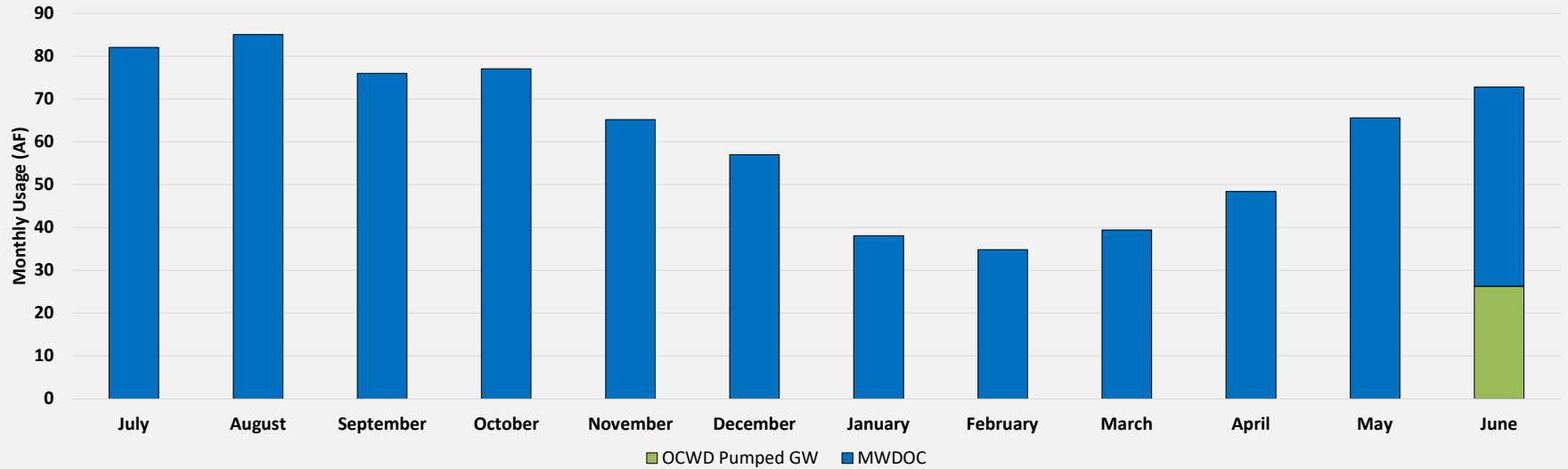
2023-24 Sources of Water



MWDOC Calendar Year and Fiscal Year Purchases



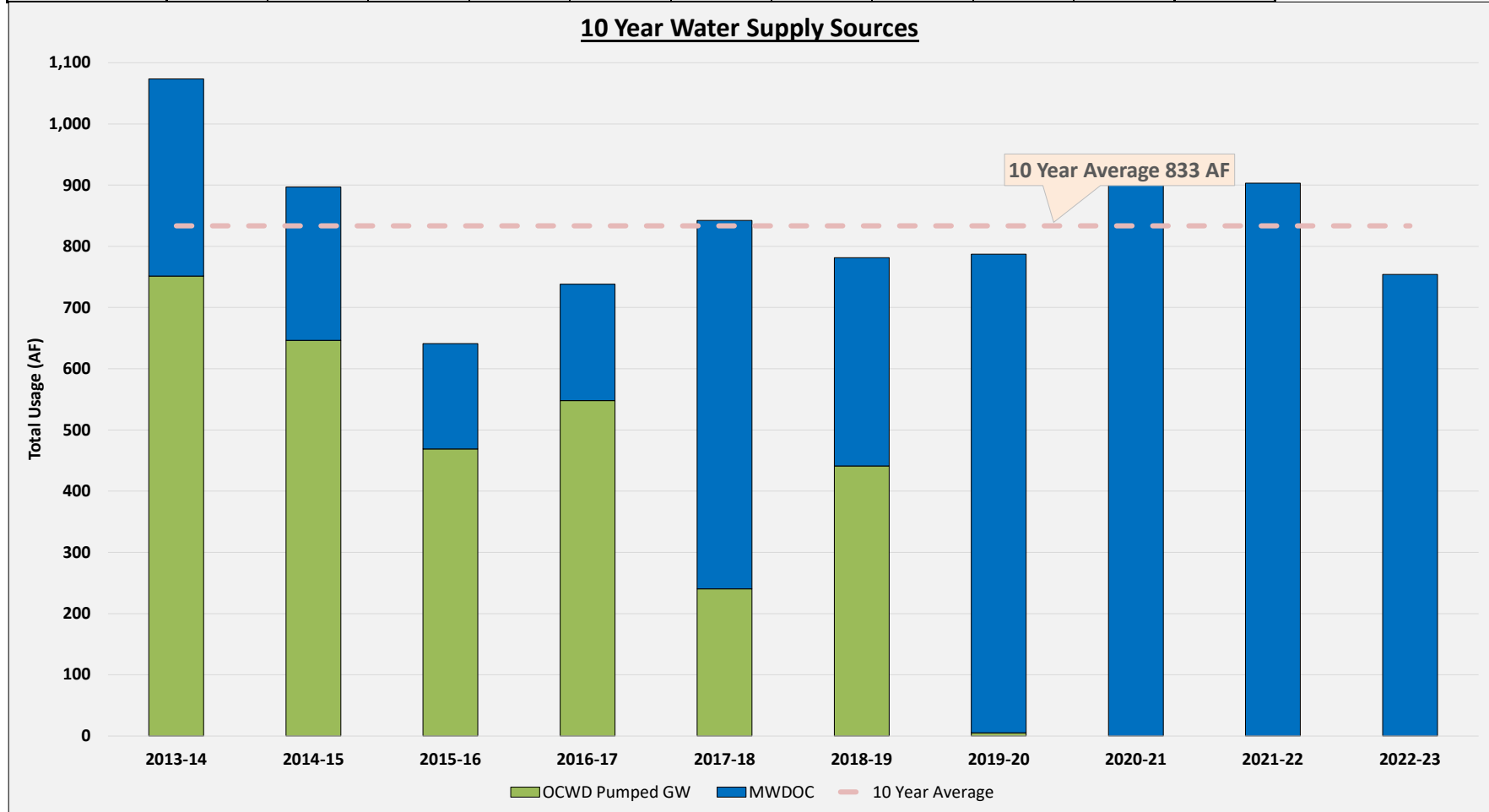
2023-24 Monthly Water Supply Sources

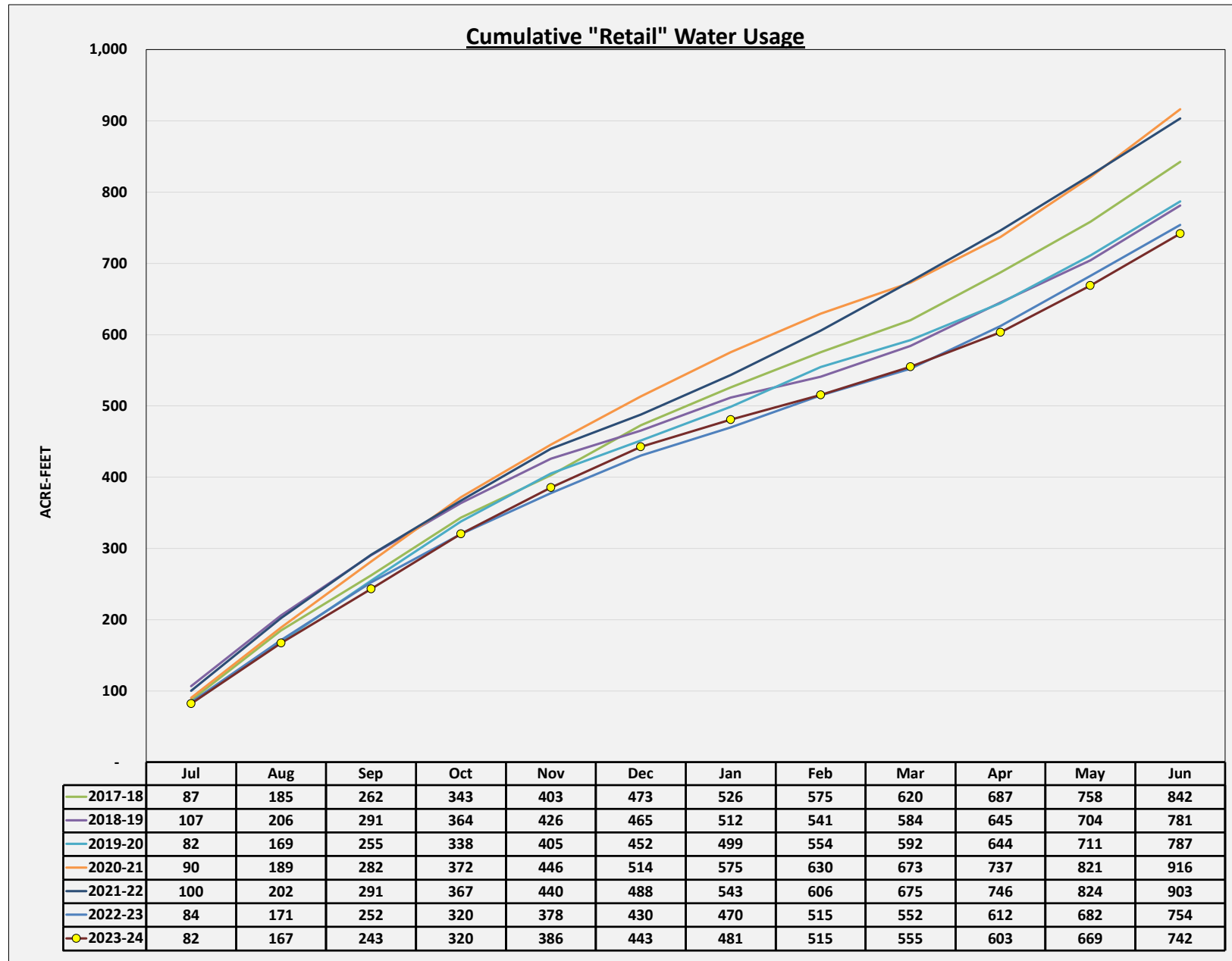

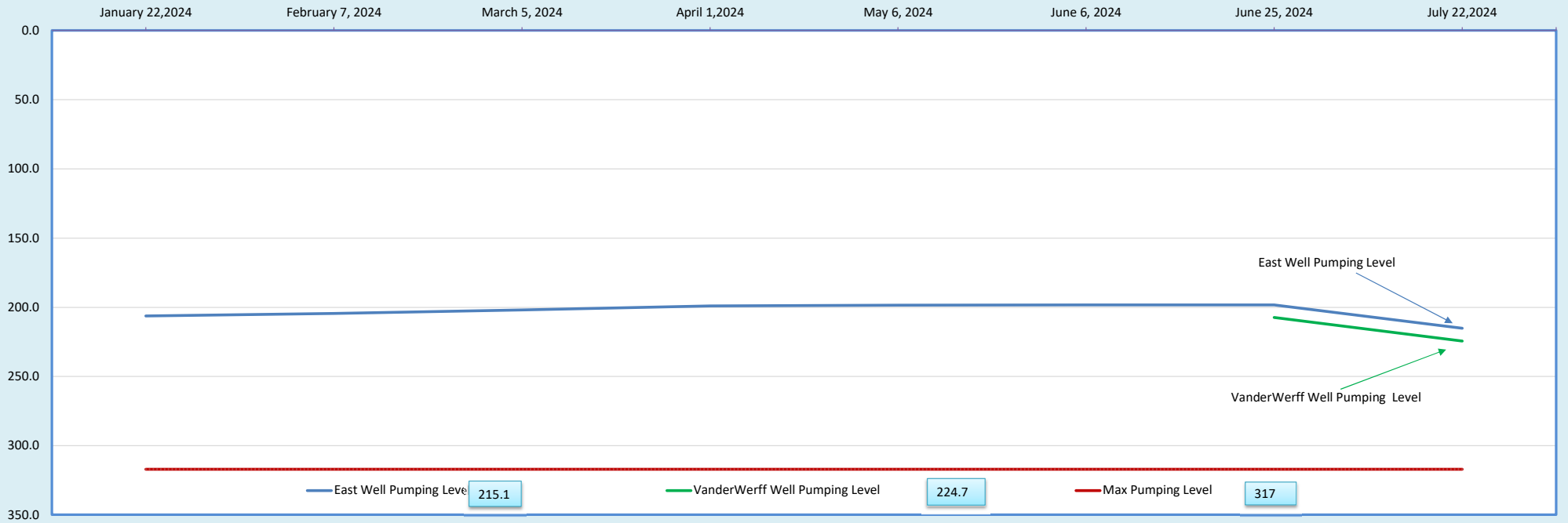


East Orange County Retail Zone Water Usage Report

DATE: JULY 25, 2024

Background

Mr. Micah Fromkin is the property owner at 1892 E. Lemon Hights Drive. Mr. Fromkin attended the Board meeting on June 27, 2024 and requested an agendized item at the next Board meeting to discuss fees for his septic to sewer connection. A detailed letter from Mr. Fromkin and family requesting waiver of fees is attached.

Mr. Fromkin's property at 1892 Lemon Heights Drive includes an existing single-family residence (SFR) and an existing two-story detached garage. The SFR is currently connected to a septic system. The Property owner, Mr. Micah Fromkin, applied for connection of the ADU to the sewer and provided a site plan showing the proposed 375 foot long 6" private sewer main with 4" lateral connection, and renovation plans to convert the second floor of the garage into an ADU. Staff notified Mr. Fromkin that because the proposed ADU is being constructed in an existing accessory structure, there would not be any fees for the ADU. Standard connection fees are being charged for the conversion from septic to sewer. The permit was finalized in June and staff notified Mr. Fromkin that the permit was ready to be issued. To Whom it may concern,

Hello, my name is Micah Fromkin. My family and I live at 1892 E lemon Heights Dr. in Santa Ana. I have been working for about a year and half on getting approval for a waste management system for the ADU I am trying to build for my father.

I began my inquiries back in March of last year by reaching out to the Water Board for direction in regards to increasing my septic capacity for the additional living space. I was told that my lot was not large enough to process the additional amount of waste.

I have subsequently reached out to the Susan Beeson at the Water Board again for additional guidance. I was told that it might be possible to install a new type of system to combat the nitrogen (which I believe is the chief concern) that leaches from the waste. I began to go through the process but was immediately stopped at step 1 which requires a percolation test. I know from tests my neighbor has done that our ground does not percolate properly (this has prevented him from developing his lot behind me)

So, I was again stopped from moving forward with the septic system capacity increase. I was told by the Water Board that sewer was my only solution.

The closest sewer connection point to me is roughly 400 ft away. I began by getting a topographical survey, and hiring a civil engineer. We go through a lengthy process of back and forth with Julian and Jeff. Months are going by. After 4months and about 5-8 thousand dollars of survey and engineering we get the plan completed.

I take the plan to several contractors. The bids range from 90k-125k. All the while I am continuing to speak with Jeff and Julian. I am told that since the line is for an ADU that there will be no connection fees. This is where we split hairs in my opinion. I am later told that connecting to the home will cost an additional 18k+. This is the point where I become very frustrated.

I have tried to walk the appropriate line and follow all the rules regarding proper investigation into the waste water treatment. I have explored all my options. I simply cannot treat the waste at my home properly, and in reality I may be doing more harm than good continuing to use my system (based on all the reading I've done on the Water Board's site.)

I believe that I am making a good faith effort to become a customer of the EOCWD. I am requesting a waiver of fees for my sewer connection due to the fact that I am paying for the infrastructure need to connect, and that fact that I am being forced into this change by the changing legislation regarding OWTS. I am paying a lot of money to become your customer life, and I would appreciate it the EOCWD could meet me 19% of the way.

Please let me know if you would like me to provide the quotes, bills from the engineer/surveyor/my personal bank information, emails from the Water Board, and or any other communication regarding this issue.

Lastly, this project is for my dad. He's not going to be around forever, and I can see it. I'd like his last few years to be with me and my family. This is the last step I need to take to get the permit for his ADU. Please help me move this forward.

 - (a). Commercial general liability ("CGL") coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office (ISO) Form CG 00 01, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury, and personal & advertising injury with limits of at least \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 aggregate, or the full occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is higher;
 - (b). Automobile liability coverage at least as broad as ISO Form CA 00 01, covering any autos, owned, hired, or non-owners, with a limit of \$1,000,000 for bodily injury and property damage each accident; and
 - (c). Workers compensation as required by the State of California, with statutory limits, and employer's liability insurance with a limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease, with a waiver of subrogation against the District, its directors, officers, and employees (collectively, "District Parties") for losses under the terms of the policy that arise from work performed by Contractor under this Permit.
3. The District and the District Parties shall be named as additional insureds on the CGL policy using forms at least as broad as CG 20 10 10 01 and CG 20 37 10 01 including ongoing and completed operations as respects the work performed under this Permit, and such coverage shall be primary and non-contributory with any insurance or self-insurance maintained by them.
4. District reserves the right to review any and all of the required insurance policies and/or endorsements and/or request a copy of a certificate of insurance, but has no obligation to do so. Failure to demand evidence of full compliance with the insurance requirements or failure to identify any insurance deficiency shall not relieve Applicant from, nor be construed or deemed a waiver of, its obligation to maintain the required insurance at all times during the term of this Permit.

H. REFUNDS

1. Per EOCWD Ordinance restrictions, if the connection has not made and the request for connection is withdrawn within 12 months of the payment date, the charges paid will be refunded upon establishing proof from the City or County of a canceled permit.

I. ACCEPTANCE OF SPECIAL CONDITIONS

1. It is understood and agreed by the Applicant or Applicant's Contractor that the doing of any work under this permit shall constitute acceptance of these conditions.
2. Permittee understands and accepts that a separate sewer line is required for future subdivision and/or sale of an Accessory Dwelling Unit, and acknowledges that they have been advised to install a separate sewer line if they desire to retain this option in the future.

Background

The District has been utilizing Townsend Public Affairs since 2016. In that time, they have provided excellent service with regard to legislative initiatives and grant funding opportunities. This is highlighted recently by the \$1 million in funding the District secured for the Automated Metering Project. Our current contract with Townsend expires on July 31, 2024.

Townsend has requested a new two-year agreement that extends to July 31, 2026. Townsend's compensation would be at \$3,500 per month the first year and \$4,000 per month the second year. Townsend's prior contract had compensation at \$3,000 per month and had been at that level since 2016.

Adequate budget is available and this item is within the General Manager's authority but due to the more sensitive nature of legislative activities, Board approval is appropriate.

Recommendation

Approve a new two-year service agreement with Townsend with compensation of \$3,500 per month for the first year and \$4,000 per month for the second year.

Background

The sewer fee is invoiced to ID1 customers as part of the property tax bill and is remitted to EOCWD in two payments: December and April.

The process of submitting the sewer service charge to the Auditor-Controller's Office is a complex and very time sensitive process as it must happen as close to the actual commencement of the property tax year as possible. Once the subject resolution is submitted, the Auditor-Controller provides a parcel listing of all of the parcels within ID1. Using this listing, staff assigns the dollar amount for each property type: everything from single family homes, multi-family dwellings, to retail stores, to restaurants – each have a different sewer service charge assigned to them; assessments must be submitted by August 1. The attached resolution includes the various categories and charges that are used to determine their respective annual sewer service charges.

The direct charges must be authorized by the Board of Directors via resolution on an annual basis; this is now a part of the ID1 budget process.

Recommendation

Adopt Resolution No. 945 authorizing certain sanitary service charges and directing the County Tax Collector to collect charges on the FY 2024/25 property tax bills.

RESOLUTION NO. 945

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE EAST ORANGE COUNTY WATER DISTRICT AUTHORIZING CERTAIN SANITARY SEWER CHARGES AND DIRECTING THE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR TO INCLUDE SANITARY SEWER SERVICE CHARGES ON THE FISCAL YEAR 2024/2025 PROPERTY TAX BILLS

WHEREAS, the Orange County Sanitation District (“OCSD”) adopted OCSD Ordinance Nos. OCSD-43 (“OCSD-43”), OCSD-46 (“OCSD-46”), and OCSD Resolution No. 16-09 (collectively, “OCSD Actions”), whereby the OCSD Board of Directors (“OCSD Board”) adopted, imposed, and collected rates and charges for sanitary sewer services and facilities provided by OCSD and established procedures related thereto, applicable to OCSD Service Area No. 7 (hereafter, “OCSD Service Area 7,” or “OCSD-7”); and

WHEREAS, on or about May 11, 2016, the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission (“LAFCO”) approved the transfer of OCSD-7 to the East Orange County Water District (“EOCWD”), and, among other things, created EOCWD Improvement District 1 (“Improvement District 1,” or “ID1”); and

WHEREAS, on or about July 21, 2016, the EOCWD Board of Directors (“Board”) declared its intention to retain in full force and effect in Improvement District No. 1 of the EOCWD all OCSD ordinances, including the OCSD Actions, establishing local sanitary sewer service charges and Table B Property Use Classifications, as amended from time to time; and

WHEREAS, on or about July 21, 2016, the Board adopted Resolution No. 16-2, establishing Local Sanitary Sewer Services Charges and Table B Property Use Classifications. Resolution No. 16-2 is attached hereto as Exhibit A, and incorporated herein by this reference; and

WHEREAS, the Board, on April 27, 2023, following a noticed public hearing and the preparation and adopting of a rate study pursuant to Section 6, Article XIID of the California Constitution (“Proposition 218”), adopted Resolution No. 933 increasing sanitary sewer charges for Improvement District No. 1, effective July 1, 2023, with such rates reflecting and not exceeding the project actual costs of service; and

WHEREAS, the Board has previously undertaken proceedings and provided direction for the annual sewer rates to be collected on the County property tax roll by way of the Office of the Orange County Treasurer-Tax Collector and that a noticed public hearing be held thereon as required by State law and as further described herein; and

WHEREAS, written notice of the referenced public hearing, the proposed establishment of the capital charge and the proposal to collect such capital charge on the County property tax roll by way of the Office of the Orange County Treasurer-Tax Collector has been provided to

customers as required under applicable State law, including, but not limited to, Health & Safety Code Section 5473.1, the Policy and as further described herein; and

WHEREAS, a report concerning information on the proposed capital charge and identifying the properties subject to the capital charge has been prepared (hereinafter the Secretary's Report) pursuant to Health & Safety Code Section 5473.1, which Secretary's Report has been made available for public review, made available for review by the Board and is on file with EOCWD's (District Secretary); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Sections 4766 and 5473, the Board, by a two-thirds vote of its members, is authorized to elect to have the proposed local sanitary sewer service charges collected on the tax roll in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with, and not separate from, general taxes; and

WHEREAS, the Board, in Resolution No. 16-2, authorized and ordered the County Tax Collector to make said collections in accordance with the terms and conditions of agreements between the County and EOCWD; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Proposition 218, sanitary sewer service charges may be deemed to be charges for property-related services. The sanitary sewer service charges set by EOCWD comply with the provisions of Proposition 218, in that they do not exceed the cost to EOCWD to provide the service and facilities. The charges are imposed exclusively to finance the capital costs, maintenance, and operating expenses of EOCWD's sewer facilities.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTIONS OF EOCWD DOES HEREBY RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The rates and charges set forth in EOCWD Resolution No. 933 are affirmed herein by the Board of Directors, as consistent with the findings hereinabove stated, for Fiscal Years 2024/2025, in those amounts set forth in Table A in Exhibit B. The Annual Local Sewer Service Charges are set forth in Table B in Exhibit C. Both Exhibits B and C are incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 2. Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Sections 4766 and 5473, the County Tax Assessor is hereby ordered and directed to include sanitary sewer service charges, as adopted by EOCWD Resolution No. 933, in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with, and not separately from, the general taxes; and that such sanitary sewer service charges be included in the annual property taxes for Fiscal Year 2024/2025.

Section 3. Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Section 5473, this Resolution shall remain in full force and effect until amended or repealed, or until such time as the rates of the sanitary sewer charges, as established by EOCWD Resolution No. 933, are changed by increasing the annual rate.

Section 4. The General Manager of EOCWD, or her designee, shall be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to execute any necessary documents or agreements to implement the order set forth in Section 2 of this Resolution.

Background

Pascal and Ludwig (P&L) was awarded the VanderWerff Well Equipping Project on May 19, 2022. The project installed the well pump, motor, emergency backup generator, and well discharge piping with valves, meters and controls. P&L has completed the well equipping and all punch list items.

Delays to the commissioning of the well and treatment plant were caused by non-performance of the SCADA Integrator, who was eventually replaced. Additional delays were caused by material lead times and the new electrical service. Staff negotiated a final change order with P&L to cover their overhead and standby costs due to the commissioning delay. The final change order exceeds the approved budget amount by \$10,068. It should be noted that previous change orders included modifications to the control valve, the generator pad and containment, and the well camera, sounding and vent tubes. Staff is requesting a budget adjustment and recommending approval of the attached change order by the Board in the amount of \$29,168.

The well is in operation and acceptance of construction is recommended.

STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

The month of June reflected the quick pace that typically comes with the push to wrap up items before legislators head to a month-long summer recess, beginning on July 3. In June, Legislators worked to meet two major legislative deadlines: the passage of the budget and the final day for bills to be considered in their second house policy committee.

The Legislature in both houses worked to reach a compromise prior to the constitutional deadline to approve a State budget by June 15. In the following week, the Legislature negotiated with the Administration on a comprehensive budget framework for 2024-25. On June 26, both houses passed, and the Governor signed the 2024-25 Budget Act into law prior to the constitutional deadline of July 1.

In addition to the busy month of legislative deadlines, June 27 marked the deadline for initiatives to qualify for the November 2024 general election ballot.

Below is an overview of pertinent state actions from the month of June.

STATE BUDGET

Budget Act Signed into Law – Remaining Budget Package Passed and Awaiting Signature

Following the adoption of the preliminary Budget Act, on Saturday, June 22, Governor Newsom, Senate President pro Tempore Mike McGuire, and Speaker Robert Rivas announced their agreement on a proposed 2024-25 California state budget plan. In addition to the proposed agreement, the Legislature released 19 budget-related bills.

In the late afternoon on June 26, the Assembly and Senate deliberated and voted on the 19 various budget related bills. Both houses approved 18 of the 19 budget trailer bills, with the final bill being up for consideration during the floor session the next day, on June 27. In accordance with Constitutional budget deadlines, on June 26, Governor Newsom signed the State Budget Act into law, along with two trailer bills related to budget revenue streams. The bill package – AB 107, SB 154, and SB 167 – was the first of a slew of additional budget amending bills and trailer bills signed into law, and it is anticipated the Governor will be signing the remaining trailer bills in early July. AB 107, the 2024 Budget Act, represents the budget framework necessary to meet the state’s constitutional deadlines and did not reflect a compromise deal between the Legislature

and the Governor's Administration. It is anticipated that the Governor will sign the budget trailer bills in the coming days.

The 2024-25 compromise state budget plan includes **\$211.5 billion** of General Fund spending, **\$86.4 billion** of spending from other state funds, and **\$153 billion** from federal funds flowing through the state treasury. The budget agreement addresses the **\$28 billion** budget deficit that remained after the early actions that were taken this session. The budget largely uses the same structure that was approved through the budget bill that was adopted by the Legislature in early June, meaning it includes a three-year suspension of medium-sized and large businesses use of net operating loss (NOL) deductions and tax credits starting in 2024, one year earlier than the Governor's May Revision proposal, as well as Proposition 98 deferrals from previous budget years. These actions provided additional resources for the 2024-25 state budget, which is used to offset many of the program cuts that were proposed by the Administration as part of the January Budget Proposal and May Revise.

The Budget compromise aims to balance the budget in the 2024-25 fiscal year, as well as the 2025-26 fiscal year, but it will leave projected budget deficits beginning in 2026-27. To help offset future budget issues, the Legislature is working with the Administration on proposals that would create a new temporary holding account for projected budget surpluses to ensure that a portion of the future surpluses materialize and create greater certainty about budgetary conditions. Additionally, the Legislature is working with the Administration to place a constitutional amendment on a future state ballot (likely 2026 statewide primary ballot) to expand the maximum size of the rainy-day fund and to exclude certain state reserve deposits from the Gann limit.

While the actions of the Legislature on June 26 constitute the majority of the work to be done this year on the state budget, it is possible that the Legislature may need to consider additional budget trailer bills prior to the end of session, in August, in order to provide statutory direction for some of the items contained within the budget.

STATE LEGISLATURE

In addition to meeting the statutory Budget deadline, the Legislature was in full swing with policy committee hearings and legislative amendments throughout the month of June. Legislators have until July 3 to pass bills through their respective policy committees. The July 3 deadline also signals the beginning of the legislative summer recess upon adjournment. Given that policy committees offer the appropriate forum for policy changes and amendments, the month of June featured numerous changes as members and stakeholders modified policies to increase their chances of passing into law.

Taxpayer Protection Act Removed from November Ballot

On June 20, in a 7-0 decision, the California Supreme Court [issued](#) a peremptory writ of mandate directing the Secretary of State to not proceed with placing the Taxpayer Protection Act on the November General Election Ballot.

The Taxpayer Protection Act would have made it extremely difficult for the state and local governments to maintain or enact new taxes and fees via the retroactive invalidation of recently

passed tax initiatives, raising voter thresholds for the passage of new taxes, and inciting legal challenges to taxes and fees.

The Court's decision largely hinged on the process by which the Constitutional changes were sought to be carried out. It ruled that the Taxpayer Protection Initiative goes beyond amending the state constitution, and instead revises the core functions of state/local democracy. To carry out this proposal, the Court has determined that the initiative proponents needed to go through the constitutional revision process, via a constitutional convention. Specifically, the Court cited the below from its decision:

"We stress initially the limited nature of our inquiry. We do not consider or weigh the economic or social wisdom or general propriety of the initiative." (Amador Valley Joint Union High Sch. Dist. v. State Bd. of Equalization (1978) 22 Cal.3d 208, 219 (Amador Valley).) The only question before us is whether the measure may be validly enacted by initiative. After considering the pleadings and briefs filed by the parties and amici curiae as well as the parties' oral arguments, we conclude that Petitioners have clearly established that the challenged measure would revise the Constitution without complying with the appropriate procedure. The changes proposed by the [Taxpayer Protection Act] are within the electorate's prerogative to enact, but because those changes would substantially alter our basic plan of government, the proposal cannot be enacted by initiative. It is instead governed by the procedures for revising our Constitution. We therefore issue a peremptory writ of mandate directing the Secretary to refrain from taking any steps to place the [Taxpayer Protection Act] on the November 5, 2024 election ballot or to include the measure in the voter information guide."

"As relevant here, article XVIII of the California Constitution provides that the electorate "may amend the Constitution by initiative" (art. XVIII, § 3) but that an effort "to revise the Constitution" must proceed by way of a constitutional convention and popular ratification (id., § 2) or by submission to the voters from a supermajority of the Legislature (id., §§ 1, 3). (See Amador Valley, supra, 22 Cal.3d at p. 221.) After reviewing the petition and the opposition filed by Proponent, we determined that Petitioners had made a prima facie showing that the [Taxpayer Protection Act] would amount to an invalid constitutional revision based on its far-reaching changes to existing processes by which revenue measures are enacted and maintained at the state and local levels."

The deadline to place measures on the November General Election ballot is June 27. As such, there will not be sufficient time for initiative proponents to go through the steps necessary to place this measure before voters this fall.

Climate Bond Text Released

On June 30, the long anticipated amendments for the Climate Bond were released via SB 867 (Allen). The Legislature is entering the final week before they break for Summer Recess (July 4 – August 5). Because it is an election year with a fast approaching deadline to place items on the ballot, several last-minute actions will shape the state's initiative ballot over the next three days. The two bond proposals released on June 30 total \$20 billion - \$10 billion for climate related projects and \$10 billion for K-12 and community colleges facility improvements. A high level overview of the updated climate bond text is below. Priority areas in the bond are bolded:

SB 867 (Allen) The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024.

- \$3.8 billion for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience programs
- \$1.5 billion for wildfire and forest resilience
- \$450 million for extreme heat mitigation
- \$1.2 billion for biodiversity programs
- \$700 million for park creation and outdoor access
- \$850 million for clean air programs

LEGISLATIVE BRANCH ACTIVITY

Tax Policy is Set to Consume Capitol Hill in 2025

In 2025, the 2017 Tax Cuts and Jobs Act expires providing an opportunity to shape tax policy for the rest of the decade. Lawmakers are already positioning themselves to be influential during the debate. In April, House Ways and Means Committee Republicans announced a set of Tax Teams established to draft their priorities and create legislative solutions ahead of the pivotal year.

The House Ways and Means Committee Tax Teams are comprised of Republican Committee members with each team assigned specific areas of tax policy for review. Portfolio areas include American Manufacturing, Working Families, American Workforce, Main Street, New Economy, Rural America, Community Development, Supply Chains, U.S. Innovation, and Global Competitiveness. There has not been a formal announcement for Democrats, but that is susceptible to change after the November elections.

Tax legislation is shaping up to be the biggest priority, aside from annual spending bills, in the 119th Congress. Popular tax legislation that passed either the House or Senate, but did not become law, will be on the table for discussion next year. Popular tax legislation that we anticipate will be relevant next year include:

- State and Local Tax provisions (SALT)
- [H.R. 7024](#) Tax Relief for American Families and Workers Act of 2024
- [S. 3673](#) Affordable Housing and Homeownership Protection Act of 2024.
- [H.R. 5863](#) Federal Disaster Tax Relief Act

It is anticipated that the future tax package will be comprehensive, with everything on the negotiating table.

Update on 2024 Water Resources Development Act (WRDA)

The House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure advanced the 2024 Water Resources Development Act (H.R. 8812) on June 26. WRDA authorizes studies, projects, and programs for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE). These projects address various water resource challenges, including flood risk management, navigation improvements, and ecosystem restoration.

The Senate Committee on Environment and Public Works advanced their version of the 2024 WRDA in May. Both the House and Senate will conference over the next few months to produce a comprehensive bill for President Biden to sign.

WRDA bills are typically passed biennially, reflecting ongoing needs and priorities in water resource infrastructure. Each WRDA bill authorizes the study and construction of critical projects, which must then be funded through the annual appropriations process. The appropriations process allocates the necessary funding to implement these authorized studies and projects.

WRDA and the Energy and Water appropriations bill ensures that studies and projects are both authorized and funded.

JUDICIAL BRANCH ACTIVITY

Supreme Court Overturns Chevron Doctrine

On June 28, the Supreme Court ruled 6-3 to overrule their landmark 1984 decision in the *Chevron v. Natural Resources Defense Council* case, which gave rise to the doctrine known as the *Chevron* doctrine. The *Chevron* Doctrine instructed courts to defer to a federal agency's interpretation of ambiguous or unclear statutes. For example, if Congress has not directly addressed the question at the center of a dispute, a court was required to uphold the agency's interpretation of the statute, if it was reasonable.

The ruling came from one of two cases challenging a rule by the National Marine Fisheries Service that required the herring industry to bear the costs of government observers on fishing boats. Under the current ruling, regulatory decisions may face increased scrutiny and litigation, as courts will now have a more active role in interpreting ambiguous statutes without deferring to agency expertise. The most significant impact of this ruling can be seen in environmental, technology, and health policy, where federal agencies used old statutes to regulate current problems. Chief Justice John Roberts clarified that the decision does not call into question prior cases that relied on the *Chevron* decision.

EXECUTIVE BRANCH ACTIVITY

Department of Interior Announces \$700 Million for Long-Term Water Conservation in the Lower Colorado River Basin

The Department of the Interior announced an initial \$700 million investment for long-term water conservation projects across the Lower Colorado River Basin. This investment will fund projects to enhance long-term drought and climate resilience infrastructure. Currently, the River Basin is experiencing the longest-running drought in its history, lasting 23 years.

The Colorado River Basin provides water for more than 40 million people, fuels hydropower resources in seven states including California, and supports 5.5 million acres of agriculture and agricultural communities across the West. The funding announced today is for "Bucket 2" projects being funded by the Lower Colorado Basin System Conservation and Efficiency Program.

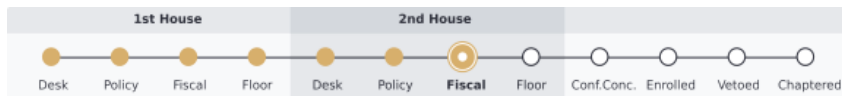

Summary: Current law establishes the Atmospheric Rivers: Research, Mitigation, and Climate Forecasting Program within the department to, upon appropriation of special fund moneys, research climate forecasting and the causes and impacts that climate change has on atmospheric rivers, to operate reservoirs in a manner that improves flood protection in the state, and to reoperate flood control and water storage facilities to capture water generated by atmospheric rivers. This bill would require the parties to an adjudication action to submit a proposed settlement agreement determining rights to water to the board for a nonbinding advisory determination as to whether the proposed settlement agreement will substantially impair the ability of a groundwater sustainability agency, the board, or the department to achieve sustainable groundwater

management before filing the proposed settlement agreement with the court. The bill would require the board to provide its nonbinding advisory determination to the parties no later than 120 days after the proposed settlement agreement was submitted, and would require the parties to include the board's nonbinding advisory determination in the court filing, as provided. AB 754 (Papan, D) Water management planning: water shortages.

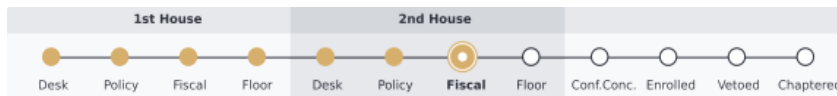

Summary: Current law requires an urban water management plan to quantify past, current, and projected water use, identifying the uses among water use sectors, including, among others, commercial, agricultural, and industrial. Current law requires every urban water supplier to prepare and adopt a water shortage contingency plan as part of its urban water management plan. Current law requires the water shortage contingency plan to include the procedures used in conducting an annual water supply and demand assessment, including the key data inputs and assessment methodology used to evaluate the urban water supplier's water supply reliability for the current year and one dry year. Current law requires the key data inputs and assessment methodology to include specified information, including, among other things, a description and quantification of each source of water supply. This bill would require a water shortage contingency plan to include, if, based on a description and quantification of each source of water supply, a single reservoir constitutes at least 50% of the total water supply, an identification of the dam and description of existing reservoir management operations, as specified, and if the reservoir is owned and operated by the urban water supplier, a description of operational practices and approaches, as specified. AB 805 (Arambula, D) Sewer service: disadvantaged communities.

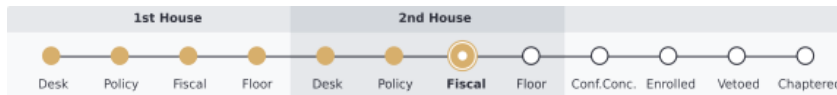

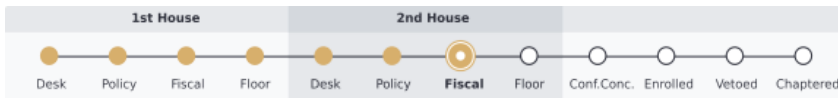

Summary: Current law prohibits a person, a state or local governmental agency, or a public utility from substantially diverting or obstructing the natural flow of, or substantially changing or using any material from the bed, channel, or bank of, any river, stream, or lake, or depositing or disposing of debris, waste, or other material containing crumbled, flaked, or ground pavement where it may pass into any river, stream, or lake, unless prescribed requirements are met, including written notification to the Department of Fish and Wildlife regarding the activity. Current law prescribes various requirements for lake and streambed alteration agreements. Current law also establishes various exemptions from these provisions, including exemptions for specified emergency work. This bill would additionally exempt from these provisions the temporary operation of existing infrastructure or temporary pumps being used to divert flood stage flows, as identified by the California Nevada River Forecast Center or the State Water Resources Control Board, or near-flood stage flows, as defined, to groundwater recharge as long as certain conditions are met. 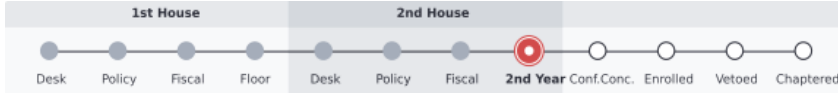

Summary: The Water Rights Permitting Reform Act of 1988 authorizes a person to obtain a right to appropriate water for a small domestic use, small irrigation use, or livestock stockpond use upon first registering the use, as those uses are defined by the act, with the State Water Resources Control Board and thereafter applying the water to reasonable and beneficial use with due diligence. The act requires the registration of water use to be made upon a form prescribed by the board that requires, among other things, a certification that the registrant has contacted a representative of the Department of Fish and Wildlife and has agreed to comply with conditions set forth by the department. The act requires the board to establish reasonable general conditions to which all appropriations made pursuant to the act are required to be subject, including, among other things, that all conditions lawfully required by the department are conditions upon the appropriations. The act provides that the board is not required to adopt general conditions for small irrigation use until the board determines that funds are available for that purpose, and that a registration for small irrigation use pursuant to the act is not authorized until the board establishes general conditions for small irrigation use to protect instream beneficial uses, as specified. This bill would require the board to give priority to adopting, on or before June 30, 2027, except as provided, general conditions that permit specified registrants to store water for small irrigation use during times of high streamflow in exchange for those registrants reducing diversions during periods of low streamflow, as specified. AB 1205 (Bauer-Kahan, D) Water rights: sale, transfer, or lease: agricultural lands.

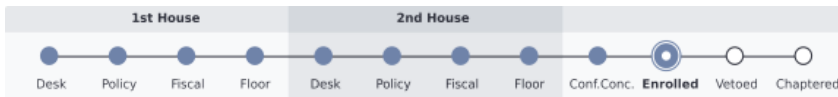

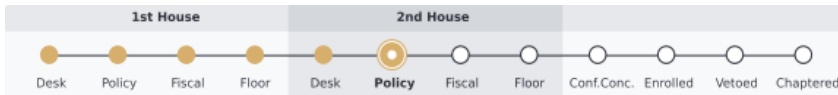

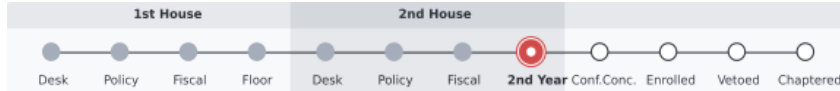

Summary: Current law authorizes any local agency or combination of local agencies overlying a groundwater basin to decide to become a groundwater sustainability agency for that basin and imposes specified duties upon that agency or combination of agencies, as provided. Current law authorizes a groundwater sustainability agency to request of the county, and requires a county to consider, that the county forward permit requests for the construction of new groundwater wells, the enlarging of existing groundwater wells, and the reactivation of abandoned groundwater wells to the agency before permit approval. This bill would instead require a county to forward permit requests for the construction of new groundwater wells, the enlarging of existing groundwater wells, and the reactivation of abandoned groundwater wells to the groundwater sustainability agency before permit approval. 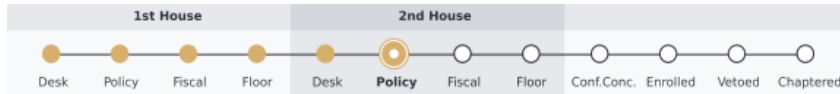

Summary: The Water Conservation in Landscaping Act provides for a Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance that is adopted and updated at least every 3 years by the Department of Water Resources, unless the department makes a specified finding. Current law requires a local agency to adopt the model ordinance or to adopt a water efficient landscape ordinance that is at least as effective in conserving water as the updated model ordinance, except as specified. Current law specifies the provisions of the updated model ordinance, as provided. Current law includes a related statement of legislative findings and declarations. This bill would require the updated model ordinance to include provisions that require that plants included in a landscape design plan be selected based on their adaptability to climatic, geological, and topographical conditions of the project site, as specified. The bill would also exempt landscaping that is part of a culturally specific project, as defined, ecological restoration projects that do not require a permanent irrigation system, mined-land reclamation projects that do not require a permanent irrigation system, and existing plant collections, as part of botanical gardens and arboretums open to the public, from the model ordinance. The bill would require the updated model ordinance to include provisions that, among other changes, prohibit the use of traditional overhead sprinklers on all new and rehabilitated landscapes and require that new and rehabilitated landscapes use only water efficient irrigation devices. AB 1597 (Alvarez, D) Water quality: California-Mexico cross-border watersheds.

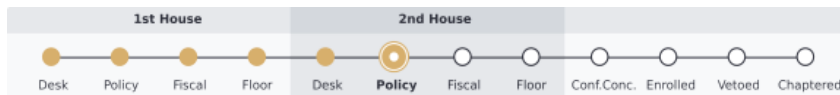

Summary: Current law establishes the California Border Environmental and Public Health Protection Fund in the State Treasury to receive funds appropriated in the annual Budget Act, including, but not limited to, proceeds of bonds sold as specified, and other sources, such as from the North American Development Bank (NADBank), and makes money in the fund available, upon appropriation, to the California-Mexico Border Relations Council, a state entity. Money in the fund is used to assist local governments in implementation of projects to identify and resolve environmental and public health problems that directly threaten the health or environmental quality of California residents or sensitive natural resources of the California border region, among other purposes. This bill would authorize, upon appropriation by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act or another statute, funds to be made available to the California Environmental Protection Agency (CalEPA) for NADBank for loans, grants, and direct expenditures to address water quality problems arising in the California-Mexico cross-border watersheds. The bill would require the funding to be available for specified purposes, as provided, including water quality projects for the Tijuana River, and would make 10% of the funding available for the administrative costs of implementing these provisions. AB 1820 (Schiavo, D) Housing development projects: applications: fees and exactions.

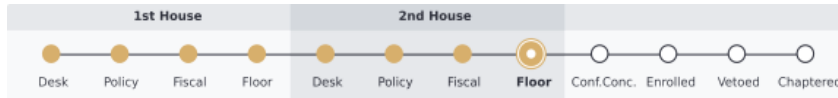

Summary: Current law requires a city or county to deem an applicant for a housing development project to have submitted a preliminary application upon providing specified information about the proposed project to the city or county from which approval for the project is being sought. Current law requires a housing development project be subject only to the ordinances, policies, and standards adopted and in effect when the preliminary application was submitted. This bill would authorize a development proponent that submits a preliminary application for a housing development project to request a preliminary fee and exaction estimate, as defined, and would require a city, county, or city and county to provide the estimate within 30 business days of the submission of the preliminary application. For development fees imposed by an agency other than a city, county, or city and county, the bill would require the development proponent to request the fee schedule from the agency that imposes the fee without delay. 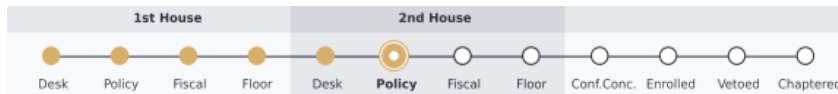

Summary: The California Constitution specifies various requirements with respect to the levying of assessments and property-related fees and charges by a local agency, including requiring that the local agency provide public notice and a majority protest procedure in the case of assessments and submit property-related fees and charges for approval by property owners subject to the fee or charge or the electorate residing in the affected area following a public hearing. Current law, known as the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act, prescribes specific procedures and parameters for local jurisdictions to comply with these requirements and, among other things, authorizes an agency providing water, wastewater, sewer, or refuse collection services to adopt a schedule of fees or charges authorizing automatic adjustments that pass through increases in wholesale charges for water, sewage treatment, or wastewater treatment or adjustments for inflation under certain circumstances. Current law defines, among other terms, the term “water” for these purposes to mean any system of public improvements intended to provide for the production, storage, supply, treatment, or distribution of water from any source. This bill would provide that the fees or charges for property-related water service imposed or increased, as specified, may include the incrementally higher costs of water service due to specified factors, including the higher water usage demand of parcels. Current law authorizes any local agency or combination of local agencies overlying a groundwater basin to decide to become a groundwater sustainability agency for that basin and imposes specified duties upon that agency or combination of agencies, as provided. Current law requires the State Water Resources Control Board to adopt a model water well, cathodic protection well, and monitoring well drilling and abandonment ordinance implementing certain standards for water well construction, maintenance, and abandonment and requires each county, city, or water agency, where appropriate, to adopt a water well, cathodic protection well, and monitoring well drilling and abandonment ordinance that meets or exceeds certain standards. Under current law, if a county, city, or water agency, where appropriate, fails to adopt an ordinance establishing water well, cathodic protection well, and monitoring well drilling and abandonment standards, the model ordinance adopted by the state board is required to take effect, and is required to be enforced by the county or city and have the same force and effect as if adopted as a county or city ordinance. This bill would require a local enforcement agency, as defined, to perform specified activities at least 30 days before determining whether to approve a permit for a new large-diameter, high-capacity well, as defined. By imposing additional requirements on a local enforcement agency, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. (Based on 06/03/2024 text)

AB 2172 (Wallis, R) Irrigation districts: Imperial Irrigation District: electricity: assessment and inventory of assets.

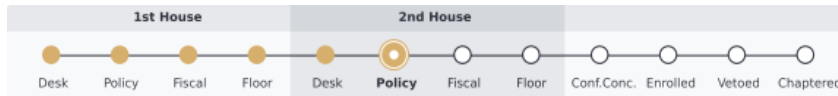

Summary: The California Constitution specifies various requirements with respect to the levying of assessments and property-related fees and charges by a local agency, including notice, hearing, and protest procedures, depending on the character of the assessment, fee, or charge. Current law, known as the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act, prescribes specific procedures and parameters for local jurisdictions to comply with these requirements. This bill would prohibit, if a local agency complies with specified procedures, a person or entity from bringing a judicial action or proceeding alleging noncompliance with the constitutional provisions for any new, increased, or extended fee or assessment, as defined, unless that person or entity has timely submitted to the local agency a written objection to that fee or assessment that specifies the grounds for alleging noncompliance, as specified. This bill would provide that local agency responses to the timely submitted written objections shall go to the weight of the evidence supporting the agency's compliance with the substantive limitations on fees and assessments imposed by the constitutional provisions. 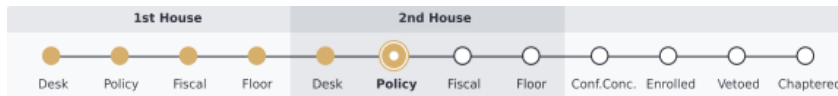

Summary: Current law requires each of the 9 California regional water quality control boards to formulate and adopt water quality control plans for all areas within the region, as provided. Current law requires specified moneys to be paid into the State Water Pollution Cleanup and Abatement Account, which is established in the State Water Quality Control Fund, including, among other moneys, the proceeds of civil penalties for violations of certain waste discharge requirements. Current law continuously appropriates moneys in the account for specified purposes, including, among others, the payment of grant moneys to eligible entities to assist in cleaning up a waste, abating the effects of a waste on waters of the state, or addressing an urgent drinking water need. This bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board to, no later than January 1 of each year, post on its internet website a report describing the receipts and expenditures of the State Water Pollution Cleanup and Abatement Account, as provided. The bill would require the board to provide the initial report no later than January 1, 2026, and to include data from the years 2017 to 2025, inclusive, in that report. (Based on 02/12/2024 text)

AB 2515 (Papan, D) Menstrual products: perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS).

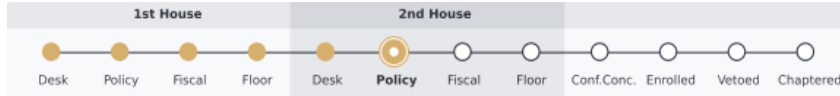

Summary: Current law, beginning January 1, 2025, prohibits a person or entity from manufacturing, selling, delivering, holding, or offering for sale in commerce any cosmetic product that contains intentionally added perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS), as defined. This bill would similarly prohibit any person from manufacturing, distributing, selling, or offering for sale in the state any menstrual products that contain regulated PFAS, as defined. The bill would authorize the Department of Toxic Substances Control to adopt guidance or regulations, as specified, for the purposes of implementing and enforcing these provisions. The bill would require the department to issue guidance related to testing for regulated PFAS in menstrual products. The bill would authorize the department to issue a notice of violation of the above provisions under specified circumstances, including that the department has provided the manufacturer written notice of the alleged violation and the manufacturer has failed to respond to the notice and, if mandated by the department, has failed to take corrective or mitigating actions to bring the product into compliance, and would specify when an initial and subsequent violations are deemed to have occurred. The bill would require the department and the manufacturer to post on their internet websites, and the manufacturer to post on their social media accounts, that a notice of violation has been issued, as specified. The bill would make a violation of these provisions punishable by civil penalties, as specified, and would authorize the Attorney General by request of the department, a city attorney, a county counsel, or a city prosecutor to bring an action to enforce these provisions. The bill would create, and would require all moneys collected from penalties to be deposited in, the T.A.M.P.O.N. Act Fund. (Based on 06/24/2024 text)

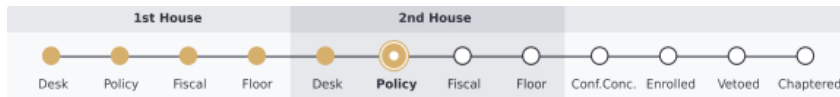

Summary: Would authorize the Westlands Water District to provide, generate, and deliver solar photovoltaic or hydroelectric electricity and to construct, operate, and maintain works, facilities, improvements, and property necessary or convenient for generating and delivering that electricity. The bill would require the district to use the electricity for the district’s own purposes, and the bill would authorize the district to sell surplus electricity to a public or private entity engaged in the distribution or sale of electricity. The bill would also authorize the district to construct, operate, and maintain energy storage systems and electric transmission lines, and to construct, operate, and maintain works, facilities, improvements, and property necessary or convenient for the operation of the energy storage system and electric transmission lines, within the boundaries of the district, as specified. The bill would require the district to report the amount of income, and the purposes for expenditure of that income, from these electricity facilities in a specified report. 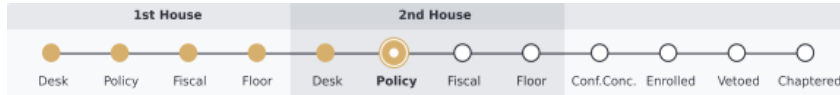

Summary: The Joint Exercise of Powers Act authorizes 2 or more public agencies, if authorized by their governing bodies, by agreement to jointly exercise any power common to the contracting parties. Current law authorizes 2 or more local public entities, or a mutual water company, as defined, and a public agency, to provide insurance, as specified, by a joint powers agreement. Current law authorizes local public entities or a mutual water company and a public agency to enter into a joint powers agreement for the purposes of risk-pooling, as specified. This bill would authorize a water corporation, as defined, and one or more public agencies to provide insurance, as specified, by a joint powers agreement. (Based on 04/29/2024 text)

AB 2761 (Hart, D) Product safety: plastic packaging: Reducing Toxics in Packaging Act.

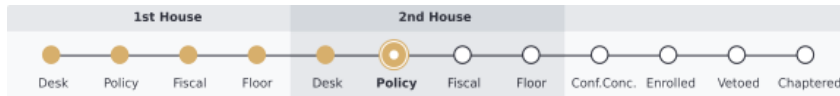

The bill would exclude from that prohibition packaging used for certain medical, drug, and federally regulated products. 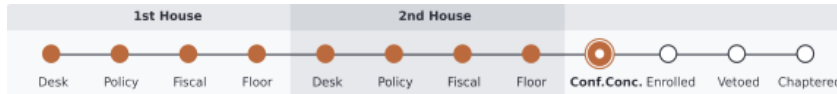
Summary: The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act requires all groundwater basins designated as high- or medium-priority basins by the Department of Water Resources to be managed under a groundwater sustainability plan or coordinated groundwater plans, except as specified. Current law authorizes any local agency or combination of local agencies overlying a groundwater basin to decide to become a groundwater sustainability agency for that basin and imposes specified duties upon that agency or combination of agencies, as provided. Current law authorizes a groundwater sustainability agency that adopts a groundwater sustainability plan to impose fees on the extraction of groundwater from the basin to fund costs of groundwater

management, as specified. This bill would require a groundwater sustainability agency to consider the efforts of small farms, as defined, that recharge groundwater into the basin upon which their property is located when imposing or increasing fees. (Based on 06/06/2024 text)

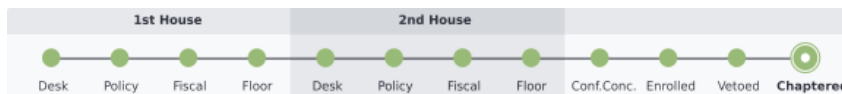

Summary: The Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act defines various terms and prescribes procedures and parameters for local jurisdictions to comply with specified provisions of the California Constitution. The Legislature adopted Assembly Constitutional Amendment 1 (ACA 1) at the 2023–24 Regular Session of the Legislature, which, if approved by the voters, would amend and add provisions of the California Constitution to create an additional exception to the 1% limit on the ad valorem tax rate on real property by authorizing a local jurisdiction to levy an ad valorem tax to service bonded indebtedness incurred to fund the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of public infrastructure, affordable housing, or permanent supportive housing, if the proposition proposing that tax is approved by 55% of the voters in that local jurisdiction; and authorize a local jurisdiction to impose, extend, or increase a sales and use tax to fund the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of public infrastructure, affordable housing, or permanent supportive housing, if the proposition proposing that tax is approved by 55% of the voters in that local jurisdiction. Pursuant to the existing law described above, ACA 1 is scheduled to appear on the ballot at the November 5, 2024, statewide general election. This bill, for purposes of ACA 1, would define “affordable housing” to include rental housing, ownership housing, interim housing, and affordable housing programs such as downpayment assistance, first-time homebuyer programs, and owner-occupied affordable housing rehabilitation programs, that are affordable to households earning up to 150% of countywide median income. The bill would require a local government to ensure that any project that is funded with ACA 1 bonded indebtedness to have an estimated useful life of at least 15 years or 5 years if the funds are for specified public safety facilities, infrastructure, and equipment. AB 3090 (Maienschein, D) Drinking water standards: emergency notification plan.

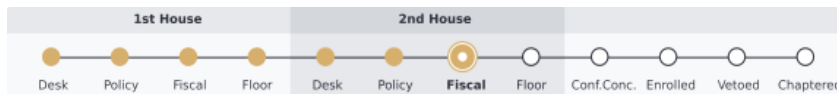

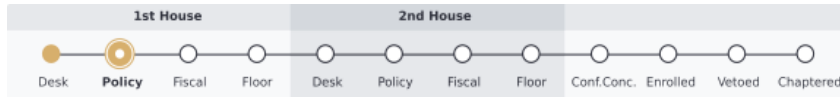

Summary: The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requires a lead agency, as defined, to prepare, or cause to be prepared, and certify the completion of an environmental impact report on a project that it proposes to carry out or approve that may have a significant effect on the environment or to adopt a negative declaration if it finds that the project will not have that effect. This bill would, if certain conditions are met, exempt from the provisions of CEQA the routine maintenance of stormwater facilities that are fully concrete or that have a conveyance capacity of less than a 100-year storm event. The bill would, if the lead agency determines that a project is not subject to CEQA pursuant to these provisions and determines to approve or carry out the project, require the lead agency to file a notice with the State Clearinghouse in the Office of Planning and Research and with the county clerk in the county in which the project will be located, as provided, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program.

Because a lead agency would be required to determine whether a project qualifies for this exemption, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. (Based on 04/24/2024 text)

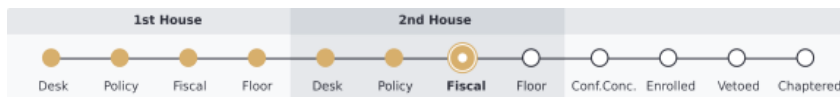

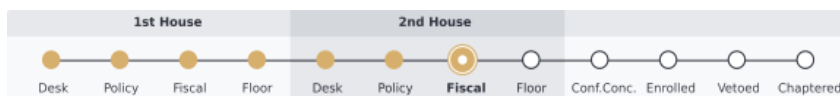

Summary: The Political Reform Act of 1974 prohibits a person, other than a small contributor committee or political party committee, from making to a candidate for elective state, county, or city office, and prohibits those candidates from accepting from a person, a contribution totaling more than \$3,000 per election, as that amount is adjusted by the Fair Political Practices Commission in January of every odd-numbered year to reflect changes in the Consumer Price Index. This bill would apply those contribution limits to candidates for school district, community college district, and other special district elections. The bill would make certain other provisions of the act relating to contribution limits applicable to candidates for district office. However, the bill would authorize school districts, community college districts, and other special districts to impose contribution limits on candidates for district office that differ from the limits imposed by the act, as provided. SB 366 (Caballero, D) The California Water Plan: long-term supply targets.

The bill would require the plan to provide recommendations and strategies to ensure enough water supply for all designated beneficial uses. The bill would require the plan to include specified components, including a discussion of various strategies that may be pursued in order to meet the water supply targets, a discussion of agricultural water needs, and an analysis of the costs and benefits of achieving the water supply targets. The bill would require the department to submit to the Legislature an annual report between updates to the plan that includes progress made toward meeting the water supply targets once established, as specified. The bill would also require the department to conduct public workshops to give interested parties an opportunity to comment on the plan and to post the preliminary draft of the plan on the department's internet website. SB 414 (Allen, D) Climate change: applications using hydrogen: assessment.

The bill would require the assessment to incorporate the findings of, and not duplicate, the above-described evaluation. The bill would require the state board, the Energy Commission, and the PUC to consider the findings in the assessment in their plans, rulemakings, reports, or other process related to the planning, implementation, or regulation of hydrogen production, distribution, storage, or usage in the state. 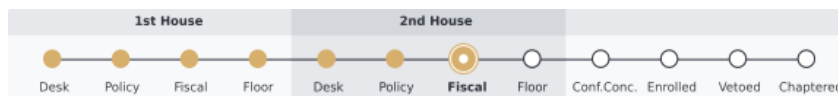

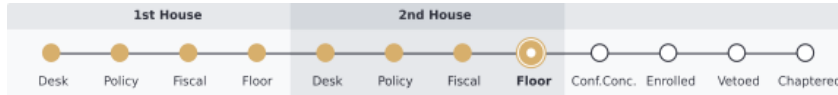

Summary: The Safe Dig Act establishes a regional notification system to provide certain entities, defined as operators, that own, operate, and maintain subsurface installations with advance warning of nearby excavations or other work for the purpose of protecting those installations from damage, removal, relocation, or repair. Current law establishes the California Underground Facilities Safe Excavation Board, also known as the Dig Safe Board, composed of 9 members, for the enforcement and administration of the Safe Dig Act. Current law requires the Governor to appoint 7 of the board members. This bill would revise the knowledge and experience requirements for 3 of the members appointed by the Governor. 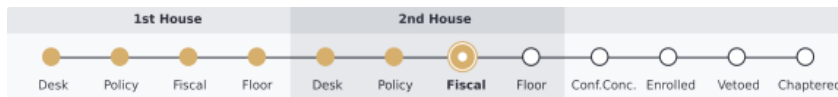

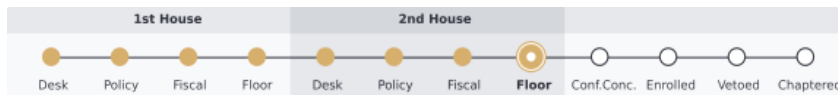

Summary: The Planning and Zoning Law requires each county and each city to adopt a comprehensive, long-term general plan for its physical development, and the development of specified land outside its boundaries, that includes, among other mandatory elements, a housing element. The Permit Streamlining Act, among other things, requires a public agency that is the lead agency for a development project to approve or disapprove that project within specified time periods. Current law extended by 18 months the period for the expiration, effectuation, or utilization of a housing entitlement, as defined, that was issued before, and was in effect on, March 4, 2020, and that would expire before December 31, 2021, except as specified. Current law provides that if the state or a local agency extended the otherwise applicable time for the expiration, effectuation, or utilization of a housing entitlement for not less than 18 months, as specified, that housing entitlement would not be extended an additional 18 months pursuant to these provisions. This bill would extend by 24 months the period for the expiration, effectuation, or utilization of a housing entitlement for a priority designated residential development project, as those terms are defined, that was issued before January 1, 2024, and that will expire before December 31, 2025, except as specified. The bill would toll this 24-month extension during any time that the housing entitlement is the subject of a legal challenge. (Based on 06/27/2024 text)

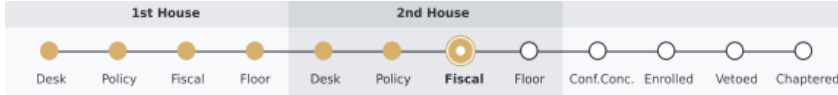

Summary: The California Constitution sets forth various requirements for the imposition of local taxes. The California Constitution excludes from classification as a tax assessments and property-related fees imposed in accordance with provisions of the California Constitution that establish requirements for those assessments and property-related fees. Under these requirements, an assessment is prohibited from being imposed on any parcel if it exceeds the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel, and a fee or charge imposed on any parcel or person as an incident of property ownership is prohibited from exceeding the proportional cost of the service attributable to the parcel. The Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act prescribes specific procedures and parameters for local compliance with the requirements of the California Constitution for assessments and property-related fees. This bill would require a local agency, if a court determines that a fee or charge for a property-related service, as specified, violates the above-described provisions of the California Constitution relating to fees and charges, to credit the amount of the fee or charge attributable to the violation against the amount of the revenues required to provide the property-related service, unless a refund is explicitly provided for by statute. SB 1088 (Alvarado-Gil, D) Office of Emergency Services: state matching funds: water system infrastructure improvements.

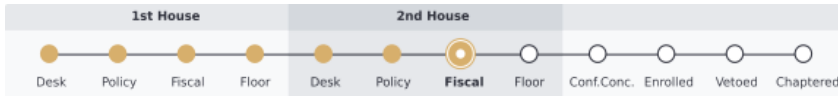

Summary: Current law establishes, within the office of the Governor, the Office of Emergency Services (OES), under the direction of the Director of Emergency Services. Current law charges the OES with coordinating various emergency activities within the state. The California Emergency Services Act, contingent upon an appropriation by the Legislature, requires the OES to enter into a joint powers agreement pursuant to the Joint Exercise of Powers Act with the Department of Forestry and Fire Protection to develop and administer a comprehensive wildfire mitigation program relating to structure hardening and retrofitting and prescribed fuel modification activities. Current law authorizes the joint powers authority to establish financial assistance limits and matching funding or other recipient contribution requirements for the program, as provided. This bill would, contingent on funding being appropriated pursuant to a bond act, as specified, establish the Rural Water Infrastructure for Community Wildfire Protection Program within the OES for the distribution of state matching funds to communities within the Wildland Urban Interface in designated high fire hazard severity zones or very high fire hazard severity zones to improve water system infrastructure, as prescribed. SB 1110 (Ashby, D) Water reports: urban retail water suppliers: informational order: conservation order.

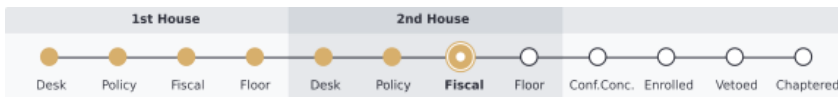

Summary: Current law authorizes the State Water Resources Control Board, on and after January 1, 2024, to issue informational orders pertaining to water production, water use, and water conservation to an urban retail water supplier that does not meet its urban water use objective, as provided. Current law authorizes the board, on and after January 1, 2025, to issue a written notice to an urban retail water supplier that does not meet its urban water use objective. Current law authorizes the board, on and after January 1, 2026, to issue a conservation order to an urban retail water supplier that does not meet its urban water use objective. This bill would instead authorize the board to issue the informational orders on and after January 1, 2026, the written notice on and after January 1, 2027, and the conservation order on and after January 1, 2028. 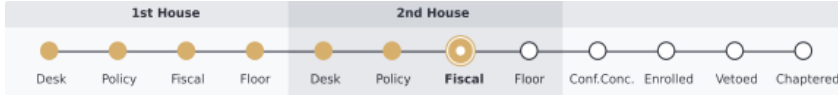

Summary: The Sherman Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Law, regulates, among other things, the manufacture, production, processing, and packing of any food, drug, device, or cosmetic, and is administered by the State Department of Public Health. The law prescribes various quality and labeling standards for bottled water and vended water, and limits the levels of certain contaminants that may be contained in those water products. Current law makes a violation of the law or regulation adopted pursuant to the law a crime. Existing law requires, as a condition of licensure, a water-bottling plant, as defined, to annually prepare a water-bottling plant report, as specified, and to make the report available to each customer, upon request. This bill would require, in the event that the State Water Resources Control Board adopts a primary drinking water standard for microplastics, and upon adoption of that standard, any water-bottling plant that produces bottled water that is sold in this state to provide the State Department of Public Health's Food and Drug Branch an annual report on the levels of microplastics found in the source water used for bottling and in the final bottled water product that is offered for sale, as provided. The bill would require this report to be included with the annual water-bottling plant report and, upon request, be made available to each consumer. By expanding requirements on water-bottling plants, the violation of which would be a crime, the bill would impose a state-mandated local program. (Based on 06/19/2024 text)

SB 1156 (Hurtado, D) Groundwater sustainability agencies: conflicts of interest: financial interest disclosures.

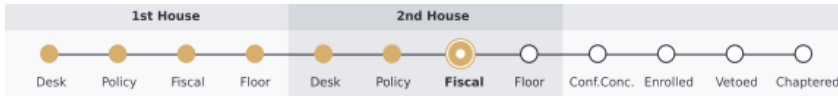

Summary: The Political Reform Act of 1974 prohibits a public official from making, participating in making, or attempting to use their official position to influence a governmental decision in which they know or have reason to know that they have a financial interest, as defined. The act requires specified public officials, including elected state officers, judges and court commissioners, members of certain boards and commissions, other state and local public officials, and candidates for these positions to file statements of economic interests, annually and at other specified times, that disclose their investments, interests in real property, income, and business positions. The Fair Political Practices Commission is the filing officer for such statements filed by statewide elected officers and candidates and other specified public officials. This bill would require members of the board of directors and the executive, as defined, of a groundwater sustainability agency to file statements of economic interests, according to the filing requirements described above, with the Fair Political Practices Commission using the Commission’s online system for filing statements of economic interests. SB 1178 (Padilla, D) California Water Quality and Public Health Protection Act.

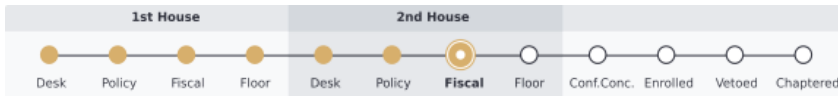

Summary: Under current law, the State Water Resources Control Board and the 9 California regional water quality control boards regulate water quality and prescribe waste discharge requirements in accordance with the federal national pollutant discharge elimination system permit program established by the federal Clean Water Act and the Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act. This bill would require the board to, on or before August 1, 2025, establish regulations governing annual reporting by compliance entities, as defined, regarding waste discharges, as provided. The bill would require compliance entities to submit a report to the board by June 1, 2026, and annually thereafter on waste discharges and their locations, as provided. The bill would require, within 3 months of reporting to the board waste discharges that affect the quality of the water of the state within any region, any nonexempt compliance entity to prominently label any product sold in California whose production resulted in waste discharge contaminating California’s water quality with a warning label, as specified. The bill would authorize the board to adopt regulations to seek administrative penalties for nonfiling, late filing, or other failures to meet the requirements of these provisions, and would require these penalties to be deposited into the California Water Quality and Public Health Impact Fund, which the bill would create. SB 1188 (Laird, D) Drinking water: technical, managerial, and financial standards.

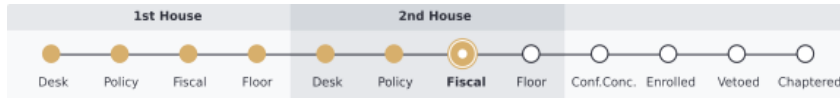

Summary: The California Safe Drinking Water Act prohibits a person from operating a public water system unless the person first submits an application to the state board and receives a permit to operate the system, as specified. Current law authorizes the State Water Resources Control Board to impose permit conditions, requirements for system improvements, technical, financial, or managerial requirements, and time schedules as it deems necessary to ensure a reliable and adequate supply of water at all times that is pure, wholesome, potable, and does not endanger the health of consumers. Current law makes it a crime to knowingly make any false statement or representation in any application, record, report, or other document submitted, maintained, or used for purposes of compliance with the act. This bill would require the state board to develop and adopt minimum standards related to the technical, managerial, and financial capacity of community water systems serving fewer than 10,000 people or 3,300 service connections and nontransient noncommunity water systems that serve K–12 schools. The bill would require community water systems serving fewer than 10,000 people or 3,300 service connections and nontransient noncommunity water systems that serve K–12 schools to demonstrate compliance with those standards, as provided. The bill would require new community water systems serving fewer than 10,000 persons or 3,300 service connections and nontransient noncommunity water systems that serve K–12 schools to demonstrate, as part of a permit application, compliance with the minimum technical, managerial, and financial standards. (Based on 06/20/2024 text)

SB 1210 (Skinner, D) New housing construction: electrical, gas, sewer, and water service: service connection information.

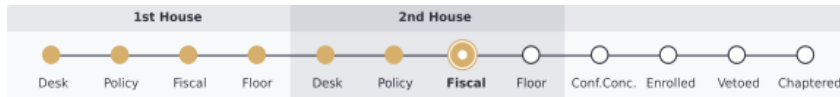

Summary: Current law vests the Public Utilities Commission with regulatory authority over public utilities, including electrical corporations, gas corporations, sewer system corporations, and water corporations, while local publicly owned utilities, including municipal utility districts, public utility districts, and irrigation districts, are under the direction of their governing boards. This bill would, for new housing construction, require the above-described utilities, on or before January 1, 2026, to publicly post on their internet websites (1) the schedule of estimated fees for typical service connections for each housing development type, including, but not limited to, accessory dwelling unit, mixed-use, multifamily, and single-family developments, except as specified, and (2) the estimated timeframes for completing typical service connections needed for each housing development type, as specified. The bill would exempt from its provisions a utility with fewer than 4,000 service connections that does not establish or maintain an internet website due to a hardship and would authorize the utility to establish that a hardship exists by annually adopting a resolution that includes detailed findings, as provided. (Based on 06/24/2024 text)

SB 1218 (Newman, D) Water: emergency water supplies.

Status: 06/25/2024 - From committee: Do pass and re-refer to Com. on APPR. with recommendation: To consent calendar. (Ayes 13. Noes 0.) (June 25). Re-referred to Com. on APPR.



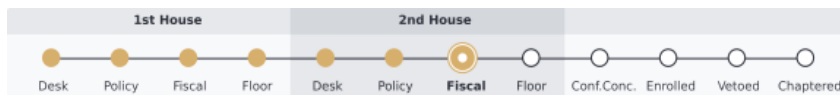

Summary: The Urban Water Management Planning Act requires every public and private urban water supplier that directly or indirectly provides water for municipal purposes to prepare and adopt an urban water management plan. The act requires an urban water management plan to include a water shortage contingency plan, as provided. This bill would declare that it is the established policy of the state to encourage, but not mandate, the development of emergency water supplies, and to support their use during times of drought or unplanned service or supply disruption, as provided. (Based on 06/18/2024 text)

SB 1255 (Durazo, D) Public water systems: needs analysis: water rate assistance program.

Status: 07/02/2024 - From committee: Do pass and re-refer to Com. on APPR. (Ayes 11. Noes 0.) (July 1). Re-referred to Com. on APPR.

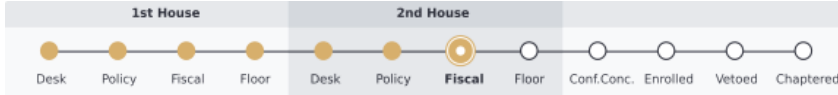


Location: 07/01/2024 - Assembly Appropriations

Summary: Current law establishes the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund in the State Treasury to help water systems provide an adequate and affordable supply of safe drinking water in both the near and long terms. Current law requires the state board to annually adopt a fund expenditure plan, as provided, and requires expenditures from the fund to be consistent with the fund expenditure plan. Current law requires the state board to base the fund expenditure plan on data and analysis drawn from a specified drinking water needs assessment. This bill would require the state board to update a needs analysis of the state's public water systems to include an assessment, as specified, of the funds necessary to provide a 20% bill credit for low-income households served by community water systems with fewer than 3,300 service connections and for community water systems with fewer than 3,300 service connections to meet a specified affordability threshold on or before July 1, 2026, and on or before July 1 of every 3 years thereafter. (Based on 06/19/2024 text)

SB 1266 (Limón, D) Product safety: bisphenol.

Status: 06/26/2024 - From committee: Do pass and re-refer to Com. on APPR. (Ayes 7. Noes 0.) (June 25). Re-referred to Com. on APPR.

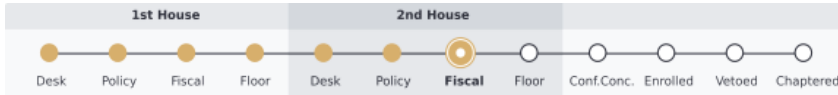


Location: 06/26/2024 - Assembly Appropriations

Summary: Current law, part of the hazardous waste control law, requires the Department of Toxic Substances Control to adopt regulations to establish a process by which chemicals or chemical ingredients in products may be identified and prioritized for consideration as being chemicals of concern and to adopt regulations to establish a process by which chemicals of concern may be evaluated. Current law prohibits the manufacture, sale, or distribution in commerce of any bottle or cup that contains bisphenol A, as specified, if the bottle or cup is designed or intended to be filled with any liquid, food, or beverage intended primarily for consumption by children 3 years of age or younger. The prohibition above does not apply to a product subject to a regulatory response by the department as of the date that the department posts a prescribed notice regarding the department's adoption of the regulatory response. Existing law additionally requires manufacturers to use the least toxic alternative when replacing bisphenol A in containers and prohibits manufacturers from replacing bisphenol A with chemicals known to cause cancer or reproductive harm, as specified. This bill would, on and after January 1, 2026, instead apply the above prohibitions and requirements to any juvenile's feeding product or juvenile's sucking or teething product, as defined, that contains any form of bisphenol, as defined, at a detectable level above 0.1 parts per billion. The bill would authorize the department to establish standards for the juvenile's products above that are more protective of public health, sensitive populations, or the environment than the standards established by the bill. (Based on 06/19/2024 text)

SB 1330 (Archuleta, D) Urban retail water supplier: water use.

Status: 06/26/2024 - Read second time and amended. Re-referred to Com. on APPR.

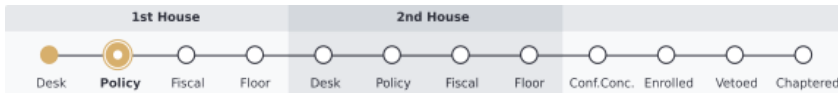


Location: 06/25/2024 - Assembly Appropriations

Summary: Current law requires an urban retail water supplier to calculate its urban water use objective no later than January 1, 2024, and by January 1 every year thereafter, and to be composed of the sum of specified data, including aggregate residential water use. Current law requires each urban retail water supplier's water use objective to be composed of the sum of specified aggregate estimates, including efficient outdoor irrigation of landscape areas with dedicated irrigation meters or equivalent technology in connection with water used by commercial water users, industrial water users, institutional water users, and large landscape water users (CII). Current law requires an urban retail water supplier to submit reports to the Department of Water Resources, as provided, by the same dates. This bill would require the department to, no later than January 1, 2035, conduct necessary studies and investigations regarding the efficiency performance of newly constructed residential landscapes and landscape areas with dedicated irrigation meters in connection with CII water use, as specified. (Based on 06/26/2024 text)

SB 1360 (Alvarado-Gil, D) Water quality: state board certification.

Status: 03/18/2024 - From committee with author's amendments. Read second time and amended. Re-referred to Com. on RLS.

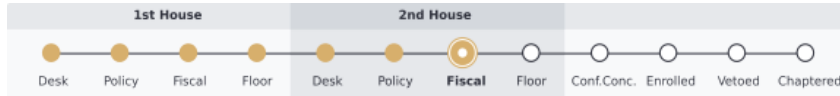


Location: 02/16/2024 - Senate Rules

Summary: The Porter-Cologne Water Quality Control Act authorizes the State Water Resources Control Board to certify or provide a statement to a federal agency, as required pursuant to federal law, that there is reasonable assurance that an activity of any person subject to the jurisdiction of the state board will not reduce water quality below applicable standards. The federal act provides that if a state fails or refuses to act on a request for this certification within a reasonable period of time, which shall not exceed one year after receipt of the request, then the state certification requirements are waived with respect to the federal application. Current law authorizes the state board to issue the certificate or statement before completion of the required environmental review if the state board determines that waiting until completion of that environmental review to issue the certificate or statement poses a substantial risk of waiver of the state board's certification authority under the Federal Water Pollution Control Act or any other federal water quality control law, as provided. This bill would require the state board to issue the certificate or statement before completion of the required environmental review if the state board and Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development, in consultation with an applicant, jointly determine that the applicant's project will help the state meet its clean energy goals and increase electric reliability and waiting until completion of that environmental review to issue the certificate or statement poses a risk to the applicant of not being eligible for federal tax credits or incentives, as provided. (Based on 03/18/2024 text)

SB 1390 (Caballero, D) Groundwater recharge: floodflows: diversion.

Status: 06/26/2024 - Read second time and amended. Re-referred to Com. on APPR.



Location: 06/25/2024 - Assembly Appropriations

Summary: Current law declares that all water within the state is the property of the people of the state, but the right to the use of the water may be acquired by appropriation in the manner provided by law. Current law requires the appropriation to be for some useful or beneficial purpose. Current law provides, however, that the diversion of floodflows for groundwater recharge does not require an appropriative water right if certain conditions are met, including that a local or regional agency that has adopted a local plan of flood control or has considered flood risks as part of its most recently adopted general plan has given notice, as provided, of imminent risk of flooding and inundation of lands, roads, or structures. Current law defines “floodflow” for these purposes, to include circumstances in which flows would inundate ordinarily dry areas in the bed of a terminal lake to a depth that floods dairies and other ongoing agricultural activities, or areas with substantial residential, commercial, or industrial development. Current law defines “imminent” for these purposes to mean a high degree of confidence that a condition will begin in the immediate future. Current law also requires the person or entity making the diversion for groundwater recharge purposes to file with the State Water Resources Control Board and any applicable groundwater sustainability agency for the basin, a notice containing specified information no later than 48 hours after initially commencing diversion of floodflows for groundwater recharge, a preliminary report no later than 14 days after initially commencing that diversion, and a final report no later than 15 days after the diversions cease. These requirements apply to diversions commenced before January 1, 2029. This bill would also require an entity making the diversions for groundwater recharge that is required to file the notice and the reports, including the final report, as described above, with the board and the applicable groundwater sustainability agency for the basin, to also file those documents with the agency that issued the applicable flood determination. The bill would require the final report to contain information, if applicable, describing the forecasting models used to determine a likely imminent escape of surface water and a description of the methodology used to determine the abatement of flood conditions. PPIC on Groundwater Sustainability

The Public Policy Institute of California (PPIC) in June released a substantive policy brief entitled ***Drought and Groundwater Sustainability in California's Farming Region***.

The brief largely focuses on the results of the implementation of California's Sustainable Groundwater Management Act, which was enacted nearly 10 years ago.

As noted in the policy brief, the SGMA during drought requires "local agencies to guard against the significant undesirable impacts of pumping". In drought, a combination of a reduction of natural replenishment coupled with increased pumping creates negative impacts.

Four major impacts include land subsidence, dry wells, seawater intrusion and a reduction of groundwater quality due to increased contaminants and pollutants.

The policy brief outlines areas of progress brought about by the SGMA. Among the improvements noted are the identification of vulnerabilities, establishing focused management area for subsidence and wells, mitigating seawater intrusion, speeding up incentives to reduce groundwater use and incentivize wet year recharges.



July 10th LAFCO Productive Meeting

The July 10, 2024 meeting began with the swearing in of regular members Jim Fisler and Wendy Bucknum along with alternate Carol Moore.

The newly constituted board unanimously approved previous minutes and accepted the previously discussed year end comprehensive report.

The Commission voted a “watch position” on AB 2661, a bill regarding Westlands Water District’s latent power to generate and transmit hydroelectric power. Concerns about circumventing LAFCO at this time exists.

Commissioner Fisler asked staff for an update on the timing of the OCWD/MWDOC Focused MSR. Staff indicated they expect a draft in November. LAFCO members will not see the draft until it’s released to the public. OCWD and MWDOC will be able to see data in advance, but the narrative will be held until public release.

The first of the meetings two most substantive issues dealt with the response to the Orange County Grand Jury relative to its suggestion that a task force be appointed to review SOCWA and waste water issues in South Orange County. The Commission declined the suggestion noting that unless there is a latent power or sphere change associated with SOCWA issues and an application is filed with sufficient funding it exceeds LAFCO authority.

The other major issue with had been percolating for months was the staff driven request for a LAFCO Board Member Handbook. Commissioners Fisler and Davert reiterated their concerns that they oppose prior restraint on their public comments. Commissioners MacGregor, Whitaker and Wagner referred to the handbook as unnecessary and handcuffing. Only Commissioner Bucknum ended up voting no on a motion to dispatch with the handbook.

Republicans Poised to Capture U.S. Senate

As part of the fallout from President Biden’s poor debate performance, other races seem to be affected by the top of the ticket.

According to the Cook Political Report - Republicans, after adding West Virginia to the list of safe senate seats, enter the election with 50 secured seats. As the election has progressed there are now four Democrat Senate incumbents whose elections are rated toss-ups. The four are Michigan, Montana, Nevada and Ohio. In addition, there are three other Senate seats Arizona, Pennsylvania and Wisconsin that are only rated as “lean Democrat”. Republicans can anticipate a new Senate featuring between 50-57 GOP members.

Trump Maintains Narrow Lead

Former President Trump continues to maintain a small, but consistent lead in national polls. Trump fares better in the polling of swing states. As we go to print, none of these polls reflect any sentiment change for Trump, due to the failed assassination attempt on Saturday, July 13, 2024. Nor do the polls take into account the usual positive bump from the GOP Convention. Therefore these polls should be measured with “several grains of salt”.
